From Jill Twiss and EG Keller, the #1 *New York Times* bestselling author and illustrator of *Last Week Tonight With John Oliver Presents A Day In The Life Of Marlon Bundo*, comes *The Someone New*, a fresh and timely story about how it feels when Something New comes knocking at your door.
- “The Strangers”** **Margaret Peterson Haddix** **Ages 8 – 12**
In the first book of The Greystone Secrets series, three siblings discover that three other children with the same names and birthdays have been kidnapped, and the Greystone kids follow a labyrinth of codes and secret passageways to discover the truth about themselves, and the other children.
